Rural Michigan Snapshot

Population

- Almost 94 percent of the state's land mass is considered rural, including most of the northern Lower Peninsula and all of the Upper Peninsula.
- About 1.8 million residents nearly 20 percent of Michigan's population live in rural areas of the state, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture classifications.

Agriculture

- Michigan's rural areas are essential to the state's economy, with 10 million acres of farmland and approximately 47,600 farms.
- The state produces over 300
 commodities commercially, contributing
 \$104.7 billion annually to the economy
 and accounting for 17% of state
 employment.







Barriers in Rural Michigan

Rural Michigan is a vital part of the state's economy and culture, but it faces significant challenges that require **tailored solutions** to improve the quality of life for its residents.

Access to Services: Rural residents often face challenges in accessing childcare, affordable housing, and high-speed internet, which can negatively impact their health and well-being.

Aging Population: Rural Michigan has a growing elderly population, while the percentage of children under 18 is decreasing.

Food Insecurity: Many rural communities face food access issues, with 87% of counties with the highest rates of food insecurity located in rural areas.

Health Disparities: Rural areas experience higher rates of disease, mortality, and chronic conditions due to factors like healthcare access, socioeconomic status, and provider shortages.





Objective Three: Understand and Review Rural Data


- Analyze and understand MDHHS data on rural areas with food security initiatives.
